GRAVE OF THE MONTH

Henry Froom Beck, died aged 70 in 1872

Beck was born in Reading and came to Newbury in the 1820s to work as a baker. He then became a constable of the borough and for 33 years was also the bill poster and town crier; indeed, his obituary stated that he was 'the best town crier in England'.

He would stick printed posters up to advertise events and walk the streets crying out items of news or events coming up soon, ringing his bell to attract attention. The last lot of bills he distributed was



for the Christy Minstrels, and an announcement for the coal club was his last public act as town crier.

The town crier role died out as motor cars made too much noise!
